# "Hands Off Iraqi Oil"

#### Stand in Solidarity with the Iraqi People:

For the Iraqi people, war and occupation have led to hundreds of thousands of deaths, relentless insecurity and crippling poverty. But for foreign oil companies, the desperate situation in Iraq is an opportunity to control Iraq's oil, and make massive profits at the expense of the Iraqi people.

#### Oil and Occupation:

Iraq's oil reserves are the third largest in the world and account for 95% of Iraqi government revenue. Immense pressure has been exerted on the Iraqi government by the US, the UK and the International Monetary Fund to accept foreign investment. As a result, new legislation could give the likes of BP, Shell, Exxon and Chevron contracts to control Iraq's oil for a generation – depriving ordinary Iraqis of scores of billions of dollars. Shell and BP, with the help of the UK Foreign Office and Treasury have been actively pushing for this law and these contracts since 2003.

#### It's Not too Late to Stop Them:

The Iraqi Federation of Oil Unions is at the forefront of grassroots campaigning against the privatisation of Iraq's oil industry. A recent poll found that 63% of Iraqis believe their oil should be developed and produced by Iraqi public sector companies rather than foreign companies. Who should decide the future of Iraq's economy and resources? The people of Iraq, or Shell and BP?

# The Work and Spiritual Development of Friends until 2014. Record of the Discernment of Cheltenham Local Meeting:

Following the special Meeting for Worship for Business on 2 December, the Record of the Discernment of Cheltenham Local Meeting on this subject had been returned to Friends House by Tim Howarth on behalf of Elders. The Record had been circulated to Friends by way of the Cheltenham Quaker.

# **Legacy in the name of David Mounsey:**

Philip Paull reported that the Meeting had received a legacy of £1000 in the name of David Mounsey. Although no specific conditions were attached in the will, his widow, Sheila Mounsey, had said that it would be his wish that that money be put to the provision of a hearing-loop system for the meeting room. She wishes the balance, if any, to be put towards the improvement of the disabled toilet facilities, as would also be David's wish. Gratitude was expressed for David's remembrance of the Meeting in his legacy.

#### **Nominations:**

It had been reported to Nominations Committee that Eleanor Pratt had made known her wish to lay down her Eldership. Nominations Committee will be seeking a replacement.

#### Slavery: What can Friends do now?

Richard Lacock had asked that our representatives going to the next Area Meeting should acquaint themselves with the issues raised at the QPSW recent conference, as outlined in the attached paper. It was agreed that this would be dealt with by way of seeking a speaker on this topic for a Fifth Sunday.

# The Woodbrooke Appeal:

Richard Lacock said Woodbrooke had appealed for funds to extend the activities and facilities of what they hoped would come to be seen as the major Quaker study centre. There was general support for Cheltenham Meeting making a contribution, either by way of a donation from funds, or by the March collection for Woodbrooke being well supported. However, Philip Paull as Treasurer questioned whether it would be legal for the Meeting to make a donation from its funds, and it was agreed that prior to a decision on this matter being taken, a legal opinion should be sought.
