NOTES FROM MAY LOCAL MEETING

The Treasurer reported that he sent £100 to Pales Quaker Meeting - mid Wales - in response to their appeal for help to replace their water reed thatch roof.

Meeting agreed that the fee of £195, and travel costs, should there be any, would be paid by Meeting so that our Treasurer might attend the Treasurers' Conference at Woodbrooke 9 - 11 May.

Following the conference "Transforming ourselves — transforming the system" (Canterbury Commitment Conference 7-9 March 2014) we are exploring the possibility of a Fifth Sunday Meeting to inform and inspire us to action. The aim of this conference was "to help energise our Quaker community in the urgent response to climate change and energy injustice", with particular focus beyond individual action to change in the wider social and economic system.

News of Friends: Mary Brown's book "Confessions of a Prison Chaplain" will be launched on 29 May. **Concern from Nailsworth Meeting**: It was agreed to send the following Minute from Nailsworth Meeting to Meeting for Sufferings:

"We ask Area Meeting to request Meeting for Sufferings to consider how Quaker organisations might best respond to the situation in Ukraine, to seek a peaceful resolution to the crisis. We also ask QPSW, as a matter of urgency, to prepare a briefing for Friends on the complex Ukraine situation and potential non-violent solutions. We ask our Peace representatives to keep us informed of relevant information and action, and to prompt further discussion and discernment as needed."

QUAKER SERVICE MEMORIAL TRUST EXHIBITION

The QSMT has been involved in the setting up of the stone memorial in the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire, commemorating service in the Friends Ambulance Unit and Friends Relief Service during and after WW1. They have put together an exhibition, which is to visit our area in May/June this year, showing Friends' relief work – WW1 is just one episode of nearly two centuries of relief work under Friends auspices, starting with the Irish famines in the 1840s.

What is the exhibition?

12 portable self-supporting panels telling the story of the Friends Ambulance Unit and Friends Relief Service in both wars, along with Quaker peace activities up to the present day.

Lydney High Street: 30 - 31 May **Newnham** George Café: 2 - 5 June

Cheltenham General Hospital, Sandford Road: 7 - 13 June

Dursley St Marks' Church: 14 – 20 June

Cirencester Meeting House: 21 – 28 June (as the first in a series of events in Cirencester around WW1)

Silent video on continuous loop (produced by Fiona Meadley) showing archive footage from WW1 and the work of the FAU during WW2

Cirencester Meeting WW1 Poetry event: Saturday 21 June 2 - 5pm CMH

Evening talk: at Cirencester MH Wednesday 25 June 7.30pm by Robert Heaven (a member of Cirencester Meeting and a JP) on *Quakers in Gloucestershire: trials and tribulations* This will include an enactment of a WW1 trial of a conscientious objector.

Archive material: we are hoping to make available on our Glos Quakers website archive material about Gloucestershire connections to the FAU and conscientious objectors. Hopefully we may also be able to display some memorabilia from the FAU in a portable display cabinet next to the exhibition.
