MEETING FOR LEARNING SUNDAY 15 MAY

Spiritual Preparation for Yearly Meeting –

Yearly Meeting this year will continue to look at how we live out our faith in the world, starting with hearing our stories. It will look at how we recognise and respond to the promptings of the Spirit to act in the world, and at how we know and use our gifts.

Even for people who can't be at BYM in person, shared spiritual preparation creates the foundations on which Yearly Meeting can build. At this Meeting for Learning, we will be considering how we are **Pushed by the Spirit**.

It will be helpful if you could do some preparation in advance of the session. We will be considering some of the following questions, which you may like to think about:

1. Can you remember a time when you felt you were spoken to in a Meeting for Worship?
2. What was it that helped you to be open and to recognise the nudging of the Spirit?
3. How could you share your leadings and understanding?
4. Was the prompting of the Spirit building on a talent you were already aware of, or by following the prompting did a new gift emerge?

YEARLY MEETING 2016: This will be held from Friday 27 May – Monday 30 May at Friends House, London. This year we are asked to register in advance so that adequate practical plans can be made. Friends not in membership are welcome to attend, but need to have a letter to the Clerk from an Elder or Pastoral Friend.

Yearly Meeting begins on the evening of Friday 27 May but a number of activities have been arranged on Friday afternoon to give Friends the opportunity to learn more about the wide range of work done by Britain Yearly Meeting, and to get to know one another a little better.

Between 15:00 and 18:00 the Large Meeting House will have displays and literature available and staff and committee members will be present. In the Bloomsbury Suite, staff and committee members would like to welcome Friends to Yearly Meeting with tea and cake and will be available for informal conversations about the work. NOTES FROM APRIL LOCAL MEETING

Premises Matters: We agreed to send a letter to Charities Aid Foundation, which is managing the bequest to us by Betty Willis. They require a brief statement of intent as to how the bequest will be used. One of the proposals for the use of the bequest was to build a small extension to the Elizabeth Fry room. It was agreed that further discernment and investigation is essential before we pursue this option, along with the agreement of Trustees for whatever we do.

Dementia Support: we were asked to consider a concern as regards our ability to offer support to Friends who are suffering from dementia, and their carers. For example, we might wish to consider incorporating dementia friendly facilities into any improvements we make to the building. We agreed that we need to inform ourselves more about the issue, and hope to have a Meeting for Learning on the subject. The Alzheimer's Society meet at the Municipal Offices on the second Tuesday of each month, 10.30-12noon, and any Friend is welcome to attend (details from Elma Detheridge)

Peace Messenger News: Alison reported on three peace related events in Gloucestershire during March, all of which were attended by people from our LM. Firstly, Spirit of Peace, who organise regular inter-faith bring and share suppers, with a speaker, in Gloucester, held an event on 7 March where the speaker was Jo Berry, whose father was killed in the Brighton bombing. When he left prison, she met and now does peace work with Patrick Magee, one of the bombers. She founded a charity to promote peace and better understand the roots of war, terrorism and violence – www.buildingbridgesforpeace.org. It was a powerful event, that had resonances with the “Beyond Forgiving” film that we have shown here. One quote from her talk - *“I’m beginning to realise that no matter which side of the conflict you’re on, had we all lived each others lives, we could all have done what the other did.”*

Secondly, a talk organised by Ann Davison from FoD Meeting, at Nailsworth Meeting House on 13 March in which Hamed Qawasmeh spoke of the work being done in Hebron, a central concern being education of Palestinian children in Hebron. He also set up the thyme farming project that Ann Davison raised money for last year.

News of Friends: Lis Parker (Nailsworth) has returned this week from a short trip to the camp on the Macedonia border, now home to some 14 thousand Syrian refugees, where Lis’s brother Paul is co-organising ‘Hot Food Idomeni’, cooking of hot meals each day for several thousand in the camp. We are pleased to learn that Judy Roles is now employed as a Quaker prison chaplain at Long Lartin prison, on an eighteen month contract.

Sustainability Gathering 18-20 March:

We were glad to receive inspiring reports from this event from Jen Cothier and Ruth Davey.

We agreed to use the energy from these to start the ball rolling again on Minute 36 (the ‘Canterbury commitment’ from 2011 Yearly Meeting). We ask Local Meetings to read and use these two reports over the next few months as the basis for other Friends to share their stories, with the intention that Area Meeting comes back to this topic in the autumn.
